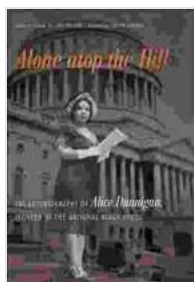

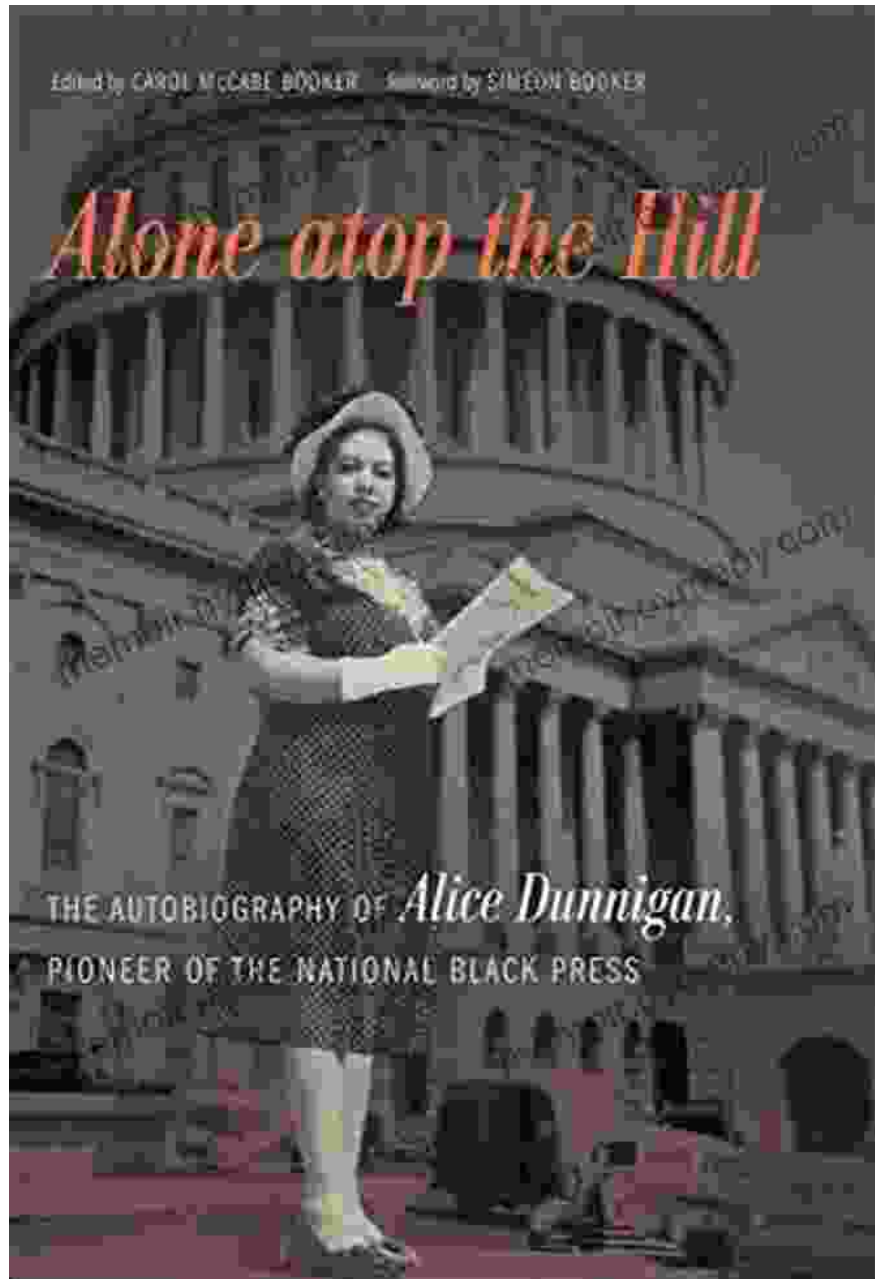

and political empowerment, recognizing the importance of Black self-determination.

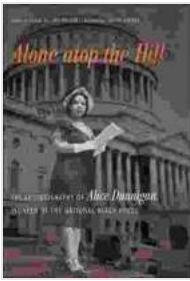

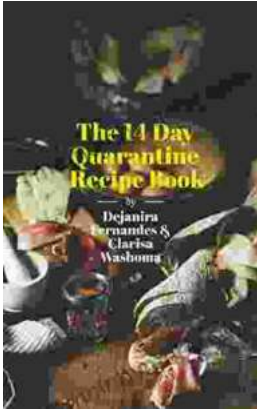
